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WAKING UP TO A NEW BEGINNING

"All spiritual awakenings have some things in common. Common elements include an end to lonliness and a sense of direction in our lives." (Basic Text p.28)

We hear a lot of talk in recovery about spiritual awakenings. As newcomers, we sometimes wait with anxious anticipation as we work through each step, eager to get to the spiritual awakening promised in the twelveth step. We sat in meetings hearing others share about the spiritual awakenings they have had. We wonder if our awakening will be like their's. Or if it will be different. If it is different, then how will we know that we have truly had a spiritual awakening? And exactly what is a spiritual wakening?

Perhaps one of the most wonderful aspects of this program, and one of the main factors that allows it to work for anyone who is willing to work it, is the fact that the personal aspects of this program are not carved in stone. They are just that. Personal. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop using. No one can decide whether or not another has the desire to stop. Only that individual can decide for his or her self. There are many ways to work the steps. We are encouraged to work them in order, write them down, and allow ourselves to be guided by someone who has experience and knowledge in working the steps. Beyond that, it's our choice how we choose to go about it, as long as we learn to apply what the principles of the steps to our lives. We are also encouraged to find a God of our understanding. A Higher Power that is revealed to us personally.

All of these things are of a personal nature. And should be kept to the individual to experience on a personal level. Otherwise, they will simply be mimicking what has been dictated to them, and will not allow the spirituality of the program to reveal itself to them. Each of us must experience these moments of clarity on our own. We can share them with others, we can even use them as a basis for our guiding of others through their own awakening. But we should never compare our spiritual wakening with that of someone else, whether it's feeling jealousy because our awakening experience doesn't seem as grand as their's, or feeling superior because we think our experience is much better than their's.

A spiritual awakening is not a one time event. It is a series of personal moments throughout our recovery that enlighten us and bring us closer to an understanding of the true spiritual nature of our own personal program. I should be grateful for each "awakening" I have, for that means I am still moving forward in my recovery.

GOD'S WILL OR SELF WILL?

The question of God's will versus self will is one that comes up quiet often with recovering addicts. In active addiction, I ran totally on self will. I wanted what I wanted, when I wanted it, and didn't care who I had to hurt or what I had to do to get it. The consequences of my actions didn't matter because, in my self centered thinking, all that mattered was that in the end I got what I wanted. The ends justified the means.

In the rooms of Narcotics Anonymous, you taught me that I needed to find a God of my understanding and rely on Him to guide my will and my life. You said I needed to let go of self will and follow God's will. Then, when I came into meetings confused about if what I was doing was my will or God's, you directed me to the Basic Text, which says that spiritual principles are never in conflict with one another. You then told me that if I worked the Steps and learned the spiritual principles and applied them to my life on a daily basis, then I would know. If anything I wanted to do conflicted with any of the spiritual principles, then it was my will, not God's, because spiritual principles are never in conflict. The God of my understanding will never have me do anything that is unspiritual.

Unfortunately, I have seen times when that doesn't seem to be the case where service work is concerned. I have seen times when one or more service members had a project or idea that they felt should be implemented and proceeded to use what was most certainly unspiritual actions to get what they wanted. Underhanded tactics, such as mismanaged funds, doctored reports, withholding information and outright lying have all been used at one time or another by service members, all in the name of Narcotics Anonymous.

It is not my place to decide what was in those member's hearts. I am sure they all loved NA dearly and wanted to help the still suffering addict as much as anyone else. But does that make unspiritual principles any less wrong? Do the ends truly justify the means?

If I decide to get involved in service to NA, then I have an obligation to the fellowship to behave responsibly and spiritually in that service. No matter how badly I want something, or how much I think it will benefit Narcotics Anonymous, if I find myself feeling the need to use underhanded and unspiritual tactics to get what I want, then I need to stop and look at my motives and ask myself "Is there a way to get this and still follow the spiritual principles?". If there is, then I need to follow that path and have faith that everything will be okay. If there isn't, then I need to admit to myself that what I wanted was self serving and that there is never a right time in recovery to do things the wrong way. In Narcotics Anonymous, the ends do not justify the means. Insted, the means define the ends.

(The Twelve Traditions of Narcotics Anonymous truly are "the ties that bind us together". As important as the Steps are to persoanl recovery, so the Traditions are to group survival and to insure that our meetings fulfill their primary purpose. Each month, we will look a little closer at a particular Tradition, because we cannot implement a tool of recovery until we can begin to understand it.)

Tradition Eleven:

"Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain anonnymity at the level of press, radio, and films."

"Our public image consists of what we have to offer, a successful proven way of maintaning a drug-free lifestyle." " - Basic Text, p.72
