CONVENTION CALENDAR DANCES

On August 3, Friday, at the Clubhouse in Marietta, "Oldie-Goldies" was the theme of the dance. Shag, bop, hop, twist, etc., was the order of the night for the hits of the fifties and sixties. Yeah for da' grease!

August 11, Saturday night, Clubhouse in Marietta, "Le Freak" DISCO. With a guest D.J. from the hottest disco in town spinning the hot-hot hits that make the nightlife in Atlanta famous and special lighting and fabulous music, this was an extravaganza event!

All of the above dances began at 10:00 p.m. with a buffet eating-rally until 11:00. Everyone was able to go to his regular Friday night meeting and then come to the fellowship and eat finger-foods at the dance. Each person was asked to bring sandwiches, chips, etc., and the liquid refreshments were provided free. The Nar-Anon groups sold desserts (Wow! can those ever cook!) all throughout the evening to raise money for their part of the convention.

While everyone was eating we heard rally reports from various convention committee chairpersons. At eleven o'clock the music began and we danced the night away! Throughout the evening raffle tickets were sold for Fifty Cents — the prize being Ten Top Record Albums to the winner. These would have cost about seventy dollars if purchased in a retail store so it was quite a bargain. The drawings were held at 1.00 a.m. with the lucky winner at each dance getting ten top LP's. Throughout the afternoon excellent Blue Grass music will provide a background for all these activities. At 8:00 p.m. there will be a special convention speaker's meeting, with an out-of-town speaker. At 10:00 p.m. we will crank up the sound system for a "Honkey-Tonk Hoedown," with enough hard-hitting country dancin' music to raise the rafters in the clubhouse! Like the other dances, there will again be a raffle drawing at 1.00 a.m. but this time the grand prize will be Twenty Top Record Albums! The cost of tickets will still only be Fifty Cents, so this will be even more exciting than those before. The Survivors' Meeting will begin around 2:00 a.m. or whenever we wind down enough to have a meeting. Business meetings are held on the second Saturday night of each month at 9:30. Being a member of the clubhouse is a great way to serve N.A. as the clubhouse now rents space to seven meetings each week, Tuesday through Sunday. Among these is the longest regularly-scheduled N.A. meeting in the world according to Bo S. This is the Survivor's Meeting each Saturday night at 11:00 p.m. which has run until 8:30 Sunday morning!

Institution Update!

I am an addict and an alcoholic. I am also a member of Narcotics Anonymous. Today I have much to be grateful for in the way of experiences, and I would like to share with you all the feelings and natural highs I have received from a group I have been attending at Buford Georgia Training and Development Center.

As the outside sponsor, I have had the opportunity to talk with and listen to the inmate members. After suggesting that each member who was interested write down his own experience with N.A., I was overwhelmed with the response. The group secretary keeps minutes of every meeting. Here are the minutes of our first meeting as a group:

"The meeting came together really good for the first meeting that we had since we elected officers. The inmated, not to give any names, came more alive when Bill W., one of our outside sponsors, started off the discussion by bringing out points about Steps No. 4 and 5 of the Twelve Steps of N.A.

Everyone seemed to focus their minds and thoughts toward his conversation and then some inmates verbally expressed what they were feeling. This alone made others feel more at ease by listening to others of the same status.

My eyes wandered around the group looking at the others to see if they were getting anything from what was being said. There were sad, scared, and eager feelings all combined together in almost all of the faces present. I felt so much better about my belief and faith in the first N.A. group in a prison East of the Mississippi, the Golden Eagle Group. There are still some who are afraid of themselves and this causes a little discomfort in myself because they are the ones who really need to look at what they are doing. Not only are they destroying themselves, but they are hurting the group as a whole.

A miracle is something that only God can give us as a gift. If I may use this one word from Him, I want to say that miracles happen within yourself. You yourself make miracles happen by admitting there is a power greater than yourself. With the knowledge of this first real N.A. meeting I know that this group will help us to bring out the power greater than ourselves to achieve the dreams that we have about the real world and not to have the illusions that we have while we're under the influence of some type of drug no matter what kind it may be.

With N.A. in our mind and body we will be stronger than we ever thought possible and being who you are and what you are, we together will make what some call a dream a reality for those who will listen and admit to themselves and to others who and what they are. The beginning is inside this group and the end will be if you leave because, without the

understanding of this group in your heart you won't remain clean no matter who you are or what you try to do on your own."
