HOW IT WORKS

If you want what we have to offer, and are willing to make the effort to get it, then you are ready to take certain steps. These are suggested only, but they are the principles that made our recovery possible.

- We admitted that we were powerless over our addiction, that our lives had become unmanageable.
- We came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.
- 3. We made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.
- We made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.
- We admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.
- We were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.
- We humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings.
- We made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- We made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
- We continued to take personal inventory, and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.
- We sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God, as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us, and the power to carry that out.
- 12. Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of those steps, we tried to carry this message to addicts and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

This sounds like a big order, and we can't do it all at once, we didn't become addicted in one day, so remember — EASY DOES IT.

Today I am Clean and Grateful

Today I am clean and I am grateful for that. Not long ago I wouldn't have believed that this and all the events which lead up to it would have or could have happened to me. Even now it is sometimes hard for me to believe. A year ago. I didn't even suspect that I was an addict. mostly because I didn't know what an addict Sure, I had some problems, just like everybody else did, but I never related my problems to drugs. I could not understand people who did not use, and I was vaguely afraid of them. Instead of trying to figure them out, I would shake my head and say they were weird. The religious people really frightened me, and somehow it seemed they were always picking on me. I must have looked like I needed something to these people, but they didn't have anything I wanted.

The time did come when I knew there was something wronge with me, deeply wrong, and yet I did not have any idea of what it was. My fears and guilts were nameless and unreasoning. or at least they seemed that way to me. When my drinking cane to the point that trouble with the law seemed an inevitable fact of life. I decided that it had to go. I reasoned that, since other drugs had never caused me any trouble with the law. I would keep on smoking pot and occsaionally dorp some acid "to keep from going insane." That should of been a clue, but it wasn't, and I watched myself substituting drugs, and nothing got better. In fact, it got worse. My consumption of pot increased proportionaly to the decrease in alcohol (which never completely ceased) and it was even harder to handle. Flashes of paranoia were coming thick and heavy, and I was beginning to think I was going crazy on those rare occasions when I got honest enough with myself to admit that much.

I'm grateful for the beautiful people who helped me get involed with the program of NA. But most of all, I'm grateful for my relationship with my Higher Power---God. Without that relationship I am not whole. With God I realize that whatever happens to me, it's all right. There is a plan. I don't have to know what the plan is, just knowing that I am not now or never will be alone again is enough for me. Gratitude is the state of being thankful.

After fighting for so long against myself, I came to realize I was powerless over people, places, and things. As a result of my trying to control or manipulate these, life became that much more unmanagable. Just the utter surrender to these facts, surrender meaning acceptance to me, left me with a peace and serenity all it's own.

Finally, I decided that I would try going to AA, in order to con the judge into thinking that I was doing something about "my problem" which I had not admitted to myself that I had, but I was up for my third DUI and looking at possible jail time. I talked to a clean addict who was an AA member, and he not only seemed normal, but his story was so similar to mine that I thought there might be something to this program. So, I went to an AA meeting the next night, where I met some clean addicts who invited me to an NA meeting the following night. I will never forget the feeling of that first meeting. I felt like I had come home for the first time, and that these people knew me and loved me for what I was, without me even saying a word.

Since that night, the road to recovery has become my trip, and it has seemed long and strange. So much of my life has changed in this short time that I can hardly recognize the person I used to be. I owe my life to NA and the God I have found, who I don't understand too much of other than that he loves me and for some reason has decided to give this dope fiend another chance at life, and to give me a better life in every way than I ever believed was possible. The program works for me, and I believe with all my being that it will work for anyone who will give it a chance. The seed is planted, and if I hoe my row, then God will work, and it will grow. Life is beautiful, baby. Wake up and dig it!

GRATEFUL LADY

Hi! My name is Mindy M. and I am an addict.
When I first came to the realization that I was an addict, I was very angry and very hurt. How could God let this happen to me? That was two years ago. As time has gone on, the bitterness has left and been replaced with gratitude; gratitude that has taken time, tears, and acceptance to achieve.

In my early recovery I wanted to get "well" fast

In my early recovery I wanted to get "well" fas and never mind the work, but let me have fun! That worked for a while, but pretty soon I had an empty feeling inside. Many people told me to pray,

When I came back I had lost a lot of reservations, but I still didn't understand the disease concept. I didn't know what an addict was! My conception of an addict was a male, who lived in New York City, and sat on street corners shooting herion. My drug of choice was pot, my secondary was alcohol. I hadn't taken pills in an abusive way in about four years. Whe injured I would even doctors not to give me strong barbituates to kill pain.

However, I knew I had a problem of some sort. At that time I had come to believe that I was insane. That was the reason I came back, I was seeking relief from the insanity! I had tried enough cures to know that I didn't have the answer to whatever it was that kept screwing me up. I didn't

even know what IT was!

When I was told not to use, that's what I did. I didn't use. When I was told to go to a lot of meetings, I did; WITHOUT QUESTION! It was apparent that these people had the answers to my problems, they had been where I was at, and they had gotten better! I asked a lot of questions about things that bothered me, and I shared the good times.

After four months clean I found out what an addict was; a man or woman whose life is controlled by drugs and the getting, using, and finding ways and means to get more. I was four months CLEAN when I saw the first glimspe of reality concerning my disease. This is just one reason behind going to ninty meetings in ninty days. Many of us come to NA not knowing what we are suffering from.

After six months clean I came to believe that this program would work for me. After a year and three months I finally accepted INSIDE that I was an addict and that it was O.K. At a year and six months I really began to apply the program to my own life.

The point I am tring to make is that we didn't get here in one day. It's unrealistic to expect to gain 5 years of serenity, ability to use the program, closeness to the god of my understanding, and all the gifts this program offers in a few weeks.

My disease is progressive, but when I'm clean it is in a dormant state, However, it is still with me. The dope feind thinking and acting

To me that meant I no longer had to make excuses I didn't have to lie or twist the truth. Although I did feel very ashamed and guilty for the things I had done. I had an empty spot in my life those things had filled for so long. I strongly believed this left me with only two choices; run away from everything, or turn to the spirit that I had both denied and at the same time blamed for all the pain and grief I felt.

GOD ONLY YOU CAN RESTORE ME TO SANITY: PLEASE

HELP!!!!!!

Let me say that I was very scared of this God. My belief was that God kept a record of all the things I had done in my life, especially the "bad things". I was ready at any moment for God to squash me like a bug!

That hasn't happened. Instead I've felt compassion, love, understanding, peace, and an overwhel-ming sense of entification and belonging.

Since acknowledging my faith in this Higher Power I haven't been to angry, hungry, lonely, or tired. I've felt the need to love others unselfishly, and it's always come back one-hundred fold. The desire to share my life, both my troubles and pleasureswith someone, has brought a great deal of joy and release into my life. It is my belief that we need to share ourselves, both our experience, strength, and hope, as well as our weakness, uncertainty, and fears in order to grow spiritually and emotionally.

The topic for discussion tonight was relaspe. The question was asked, "Is it really possible to stay clean? Can my life really get better? Will


these steps and tools work in MY life?"

Prayer can be a simple thing--and as natural as breathing.

Many of us are intimidated by our childhood memories of prayer. We remember either standing or kneeling, with our head properly bowed, while the preacher, minister or priest carried on a five minute dialog with God. We never could quite remember what he said, but he surely had said a lot of it.

Prayer, in later years, was generally used when we were either scared out of our wits or in troub. It was more of a bargain process--I'll do THIS if you'll THAT--sort of like dealing with a used car salesman.

Prayer, in NA, is simply conversation with our conception of a Higher Power. No elaborate ceremo ies are necessary. It can be done in a shower, in the car, or at our place of work. No one but the one praying need know what is being done.

Our Higher Power can understand simple prayers singles sentences, even phrases such as: "Please help me make it through the day" or "Please help me make it through the next half hour".

Those of us who doubt that such a simple method can be effective need only remember one thing... there are addicts who have remained clean for years by using it...and that, in itself, should proof enough.

We hope that this story will bring a measure of strength and enthusiasm to other members in our program of NA who work "inside the walls".



We have tried to carry the message to other institutions with some success. 

THE TWELVE TRADITIONS OF N.A.

We keep what we have only with vigilance and just as freedom for the individual comes from the Twelve Steps so freedom for the groups springs from our traditions.

As long as the ties that bind us together are stronger than those that would tear us apart, all will be well.

- Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on N.A. unity.
- 2. For our Group purpose there is but one ultimate authority a loving God as He may express Himself in our Group conscience, our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern.
- 3. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop using.
- 4. Each Group should be autonomous, except in matters affecting other Groups, or N.A., as a whole.
- Each Group has but one primary purpose to carry the message to the addict who still suffers.
- An N.A. Group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the N.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property or prestige divert us from our primary purpose.
- Every N.A. Group out to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.
- Narcotics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our Service Centers may employ special workers.
- N.A., as such ought never be organized; but we create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.
- N.A. has no opinion on outside issues; hence the N.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.
- Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films.
- Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.
