Having a home group has been considered by many of us to be an important part of the foundation of our recovery for the reasons identified by the Aotearoa New Zealand Convention workshop including: feeling like an important part of a group, giving us a sense of

My Home Group - Florida USA

My home group meets on Wednesday evenings at 19.30-21.00. We meet in a small church in Boynton Beach, Florida, US. The format of the meeting is "Chair's choice" (the person who is chairing the meeting for the month) of literature reading, usually a short selection or part of an IP - always NA approved literature, followed by three minutes of silent meditation. We aren't allowed to have candles and the lights are kept on low. Then the meeting is opened up to general sharing either on the reading or on whatever struggle (or success) that member is experiencing in their recovery.

belonging and the opportunity to work with others in NA service. Being in the home group can help us develop and maintain our commitment to recovery and give us a place to share our stories more intimately, celebrate recovery milestones and carry the message to newcomers.

We asked some of our members to write and give us their experience and ideas regarding Home Groups.

I joined this group because of its focus on welcoming the newcomer while at the same time providing a space for people who have been in recovery for a long time. The cleantime of the members ranges from brand new to nearly 25 years. Having a mid-week opportunity to gather with others for a focused meditation is a bright spot in my schedule. Nearly every week after the meeting several of us will go to a local restaurant for a meal and additional fellowship. This was a very important part of my getting comfortable in this community when I moved here 18 months ago.

My Home Group in Wellington Aotearoa New Zealand

My Home Group is the Monday night Wellington, Just For Today meeting. We are 30 to 40 people of various cleantime; the most is 24 years clean. The meeting is non-smoking. We sit in a circle on uncomfortable old wood and metal school chairs. The floor is lino/vinyl tiles. The lights are florescent tube lights. The Serenity Prayer, Steps and Traditions banners lie on the floor in the middle of the room. The venue is in the middle of the city beside the St Mary's of the Angels church, which is beautiful. Our building looks like a concrete bunker! Although the venue it is not very nice, I love this meeting. If NA was about aesthetics I would have never lasted. Thank goodness it is about our message!

I joined this meeting some years ago after the Lesbian & Gay Monday night meeting was closing. I have had a a Monday night Home Group for all of my recovery (19 years today). This meeting is the one I try to attend all conscience meetings at and also where I do service. I am currently serving as meeting Secretary. It is where if I do not attend and I have not told someone I am not

coming to the meeting, someone will call me to see that I am OK.

It is also where I feel responsible to look after/check on the trusted servants of the meeting (if I am not one of them myself) to see if they are OK about being a secretary, do they have all that they need. Also if they are a Treasurer, is the money getting to the bank? Do they know when the ASC's are and when they are. Do they need anything and are they feeling supported, as opposed to electing someone to a position and leaving them to it and only becoming involved if they are not doing what they were elected to do.

Usually I will celebrate my clean time birthdays at my Home Group. I see that we are all to support the new comers; however I make a special effort at my Home Group meeting. I was once told the only reason you do not attend your Home Group is a funeral or a death. Your funeral or death!

An Alternate View Regarding Home Groups: Home Groups are Overrated

It is my opinion that the concept of having a "home group" is overrated, especially in small communities.

In Kuala Lumpur (KL), where there are only 3 groups holding a total of four meetings a week, there is, in my opinion, no arguable necessity to identify with any one of these groups as "home" – it would be far more constructive if all members attended meetings of any and all groups. As seen here, most members of any one Home Group are rarely seen at meetings held by other groups.

It is my observation that, where KL is concerned, the

notion of belonging to a particular Home Group has created an illusion of "us and them". This does not augur well for unity, which is of the utmost requisite in small communities like ours.

However, in KL at least, there is an unwritten expectation that one must belong to a Home Group, lest he/she be viewed as a dissident, at worse, or a bad influence, at best.

These days I consider Kuala Lumpur and all its groups as my "home" – whenever and wherever I lay my hat.

My Home Group - Toorak, Melbourne, Australia

I have been a member of a home group ever since I first came to NA and it has always made me feel like I was participating fully in the fellowship. My current home group has been meeting in the same building for the last 17 years. Sometimes it can be so crowded that people have to stand in the doorway. We have a good balance of older cleaner members and newcomers and we make an effort to welcome people and provide a friendly atmosphere of recovery. I have had various jobs in the group mainly GSR and I also pick up the cigarette butts after the meeting because it is a kindergarten during the

day time and we need to maintain good relations with the people who rent us the hall.

Although I would encourage people to join a home group I also agree that we must be careful that group loyalty does not create a "them and us" mentality where groups compete with each other or we feel uncomfortable going to other meetings because they do things differently to us. After all we are members of the same fellowship. We welcome visitors from any group in the world, please come and join us on Tuesday nights.

More Community Reports

Community Report from Pakistan (South) 2007

Hi, my name is Tufail an addict from NA community Pakistan (south). There have been meetings here since 1994, groups since 1998 and an Area formed since 2004. We currently have eight groups of 5 to 15 members. About 6 to 12 members are having 2 to 10 years clean time and we get about 3-5 new members per month from rehabs.

We have been progressing translations in Urdu. We have some key tags, the LWB and some IPs but we do not have an approved glossary of NA terms completed. We are submitting to NAWS on CD an URDU translation of "A guide to local service in NA", and a translation of the "12 steps working guide" will be done within the next six months.

We have been holding new events in our community; our first ever brain storming workshop had 60-65 addicts, our area/region organized an awareness program on NA structure & the participation was 50 members. And we held a full night get-together with 50 addicts from four groups.

We need more Urdu literature about recovery in our community and would appreciate a fellowship development trip from the APF to assist us to grow, best would be someone from India. We would like workshops on the service structure and responsibilities and how to develop committees. We also want to learn how to grow our fellowship/network, meetings and members and guidelines about fund raising.

Xin Chao and Hugs from Vietnam

By now you, all should have heard our most exciting news. We have three (3) Vietnamese meetings in Ho Chi Minh City. There will be another one starting in Bien Hoa, about 2 hours from HCMC after TET. This new one will be more like an Institutional Meeting; with luck, it will blossom from that to another Vietnamese meeting.

All the meetings are in HCMC and only a few blocks apart. The Vietnamese have followed the English style of meetings, which are held in a coffee shop that sells alcohol as the English members are not allowed to meet in private.

The new Vietnamese members are getting the message while they are in treatment centers and then they have created their own meetings with the support of English members.

The number one key issue in our area is still the same, translated material and getting those that are translated approved. The USA translated version is in the old southern language however the modern Vietnamese uses the northern structure. This is not a big problem but there is no consistency in the language.

We are currently trying to get the message out to as many people and groups as we can. This is still not easy, as we have not been approved to exist yet. However, several treatment centers have stated they have a license and could run meetings. Remember we can meet only if the government has no problem with this. That is why the English meeting meets in public. We have ruined a few people's drinks with them listening to us while they are relaxing.

Hello from NA Pilipinas

NA Pilipinas now has an organized Regional Service Committee that meets quarterly. We have 3 Areas, 38 groups holding an estimated 87 meetings weekly and approx 500 – 600 members. We meet about 100 newcomers each month and hope that our service and translations efforts will encourage them to stay. Our work is hampered by the fact that our country is made up of hundreds of islands and the only travel is by boat and plane.

We have met with many Government agencies and the H&I Subcommittee are working with the personnel of a maximum security prison (New Bilibid Prison) in order for NA to hold meetings inside the institution. We continue to host conventions and held a Unity Day last year.

Our LTC has just finished White Booklet into Pilipino and is waiting for NAWS approval. We hope that all the IPs will be translated in Pilipino in 2007. Areas are doing translations into local dialects.

Right now, donations from Groups are still tough because collections are still few. The Area Service Committee is asking the members to give more 7th Traditions in order to enhance our primary purpose.

PI in China - March 2007 - Shanghai

It is with great joy and gratitude that I am writing this report

After many phone calls over a period of 3 months, we were given an opportunity to meet with the head of the Jin Yun private hospital treating addicts in Shanghai. The four of us met up outside a subway station and started on our journey to the very outskirts of Shanghai in a taxi, which took us nearly an hour to get there.

We met up with the head of the hospital who took us to his office and introduced us to a doctor and nurse, who work with addicts in treatment. The doctor could speak English which made life a bit easier for us.

They were interested to know more about NA and us, and asked about how long we had been off drugs, etc. They wanted to know what drugs we used etc. They also wanted to know which religion or god we belonged to. We presented them with a NA Basic Text.

After answering all their questions, they told us that they would refer their patients to our meeting and invited us for lunch in the hospital staff dining area.

After lunch we were given security passes and taken on a tour of the detoxification unit to meet the patients. Wow! This has never happened in our PI efforts before in Shanghai. We were stopped every time and asked to get permission from the Foreign Affairs office to meet up with the doctors. Here we met and spoke with a few addicts in the Detox and welcomed them to our meetings. We are hopeful and pray that we see them at our meetings in Shanghai.

At the end of our tour of the Detox and the introduction with the Psychiatrist we were asked if we could come in again to present a meeting to the addicts in treatment, which we joyfully agreed.

We will be looking forward to the meeting with addicts at this hospital which houses 20 addicts at a time. The addicts are kept there for a week and then sent home. We hope that the message of our fellowship and our meetings will be passed on to the addicts so that they may have a chance at a better way of life.
